



Dear Parent

We would like to let you know that our school will be using the BBC micro:bit and micro:bit website. The BBC micro:bit is a pocket-sized, codeable computer that allows children to get creative with technology. In the BBC's most ambitious education initiative for 30 years, up to 1 million devices will be given to every 11 or 12 year old child in Year 7 or equivalent across the UK, for free. The UK currently faces a critical skills shortage in the technology sector, and the BBC and partners aim to help change that.

Before we start, we would like to advise you of some key points that you should be particularly aware of. These are also set out in the Terms of Use on the website: www.microbit.co.uk/terms-of-use

PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY AND CONSENT

We will be passing on a BBC micro:bit to children and giving children access to the BBC micro:bit website. Children will be able to use the website to create programs for their micro:bit.

We'd also be really pleased to see some great scripts published on the website for everyone to see. Teachers will be able to publish your child's scripts so that they can be found by others on the website. The BBC Editorial team may publish and promote these scripts on the BBC micro:bit website. By allowing your child to use the BBC micro:bit service, you will be allowing your child's contribution to be freely used, shared, copied, redistributed, adapted, remixed or transformed without attribution on a non-commercial basis. Please see section 1 of the Terms of Use for further information.

If you are happy for your child to use the BBC micro:bit service and for their scripts to be published, you don't need to do anything. If you do **NOT** wish your child to use the BBC micro:bit services at all or if you prefer **NOT** to have your child's scripts published, please complete the form overleaf and return it to your child's teacher.

As a parent or guardian, you are responsible for their activity outside of the classroom. If you are unhappy with any of their scripts visible, you can delete them from their computer or memory stick. For scripts that have already been published on the website, you can report them directly from the website and request that they are reviewed.

PERSONAL INFORMATION

We will let the children know that they shouldn't include any personally identifiable information within their own scripts. If we do approve scripts for publication, we must be sure that the text in

the script doesn't contain any personal information that could be viewed by anyone visiting the BBC micro:bit website. You can encourage your child to look at this web page which has useful tips on online safety www.bbc.co.uk/cbbc/topics/stay-safe.

Please ensure that your child is aware of the House Rules and encourage them to discuss anything that is unclear before they use the website. The House Rules are also set out on the website if you need to refer to them. www.microbit.co.uk/house-rules

Your child's teacher will be responsible for publishing your child's content and will unpublish a child's script if it breaks House Rules. The BBC reserves the right to remove content from the website which breaks House Rules.

We hope that your child has an enjoyable experience and is inspired to explore and learn from the coding activities on the site.
